Supporting clinical excellence in research and education

The 2018 Prince of Wales Hospital Foundation Grant Round offered \$550,000 across six categories to support 42 special projects, research and initiatives for staff at the Hospital.

A message from the GM

It has been a big year for the Prince of Wales Hospital (Hospital) and we cannot thank the Prince of Wales Hospital Foundation (Foundation) and the donors enough for their ongoing support. This year, with the support of the Foundation, we have been able to progress new models of care, provide new equipment to support the care we provide and invest in innovative research.

We continue to look forward to the new Acute Services Building expected to be completed in 2022. This year we have progressed the design of our new facilities with groups of clinicians, patients and carers developing each of the spaces within the new build. We have also seen work commence on an expanded emergency department to meet the current demand for services until the new build is delivered. In addition, we have commenced the build for a second Digital Subtraction Angiography Suite supported by the Foundation and are installing a 3 Tesla Magnetic Resonance Imaging (3T MRI) in partnership with the University of New South Wales to assist us in increasing research and clinical capacity on the campus.

We have seen exciting initiatives in how we deliver care to our patients, embracing new technologies and supporting care beyond the walls of our hospital. We were the first hospital in the world to implement a voice activated nurse call system. In recognising that patients

recovering from spinal injuries can be better supported by innovations in technology and with the Foundation's support, DeloitteASSIST was installed into our spinal unit. For patients with heart disease, the Total Cardiac Care App was launched allowing monitoring of patients in the community and early intervention. In an effort to reduce unnecessary presentations to the Emergency Department, the Geriatric Flying Squad model was also trialled, supporting hospital care in aged care facilities. These models are an exciting insight into some of the innovations we have planned for the new building.

The Hospital was recognised in three categories at the South Eastern Sydney Local Health District Improvement and Innovation Awards. For best health research and innovation, the Advanced Recovery and Orthopaedic Program was recognised for allowing patients to be discharged the following day after joint surgery. Also recognised was Barbara Daly, Director of Nursing and Operations for the Emergency, Specialist and Continuing Medicine program as Collaborative Leader of the Year and The Care of Older People in Surgery Service was recognised as team of the year.

Transforming health services for our community

The NSW Government is investing \$720 million towards a new Acute Services Building for the POWH as part of the expansion of the Randwick Hospitals campus into a new Randwick Health and Education Precinct.

The Precinct will provide integrated health services, research and teaching facilities to our local community and other NSW residents along with cutting edge, compassionate and holistic healthcare and wellness programs.

Over the next three years, the Foundation will be working hard to raise the extra funds needed to complete the fit out of the Acute Services Building, which will open its doors in 2022.

WHAT THIS MEANS FOR OUR PATIENTS

Locating clinical care, research and education in an integrated single setting will mean a faster and easier transfer of research results directly to a patient's bedside.

Researchers will better understand the current problems patients face and undertake studies that are immediately relevant in the real world. The results of these studies are then available to the treating clinicians without delay.

The Precinct will move toward a more personalised, holistic approach to healthcare supported by community-based services that promote patient participation, early detection of illness and maintenance of good health to prevent illness. Our annual grant round

The Prince of Wales Hospital Foundation (Foundation) runs an annual grant round to support special projects, research and initiatives for staff at the Prince of Wales Hospital (Hospital).

Thanks to the generosity of our supporters, more than \$3,000,000 of funding has been offered over the past seven years.

During 2017-2018, \$550,000 was offered across six categories to support 42 initiatives. This funding will assist hospital staff to further their professional development, conduct research or purchase extra equipment and health promotions that directly benefit staff and patients of the Hospital.

The Foundation acknowledges the ongoing support of our grant sponsors – NSW Racehorse Owners Association, StatePlus, Eastern Heart Clinic, Hesta, Smartleasing and Nurses & Midwives Health.

IMPROVING PATIENT CARE

A 2017 Foundation funded trial run by the Hospital's Physiotherapy Department, has produced incredible results for critically-ill patients on ventilation and in the Intensive Care Unit (ICU). Using a novel technique entitled the Abdominal Functional Electrical Stimulation (AFES) – the team have reduced the time patients spend on ventilators by over 50 per cent. Patients experience better lung function and subsequently spend less time in ICU. This initiative means better patient outcomes and considerable savings on additional nights spent in hospital.


The team's hope of following up their success with a multicentre opportunity was realised in 2018 when the Foundation funded a further trial.

Lead by staff specialist Dr Bonsan Bonne Lee, the team will trial AFES on tetraplegic patients to improve their respiratory health and quality of life. The treatment is risk and complication free and easy to implement. The Hospital will also gain further cost savings. If successful, they plan to incorporate AFES as a standard treatment practice making our Hospital a world leader in tetraplegic patient treatment.

Annual grant round recipients

During 2017–2018, the Prince of Wales Hospital Foundation awarded 42 grants towards projects that support the patients and staff at the Prince of Wales Hospital.

Partnerships improving patient care

With the incredible support and assistance of Deloitte, a breakthrough new technology was launched in the Prince of Wales Hospital Spinal Unit to make life easier for 26 long term patients.

DeloitteASSIST (D.ASSIST) combines the capabilities of speech recognition, language processing and artificial intelligence. The device sits on the patients' TV monitor and allows them to voice their exact needs.

Instead of a nurse responding to a bell which does not relay the urgency of the call from the patient – the voice activated system allows patients to let staff know exactly what they require – help in the bathroom, pain relief or something more important and allocates jobs accordingly.

“We are delighted our partnership with Deloitte is helping to dramatically reduce patient response times as well as improve the patient experience.” – Lulu, CEO

“We worked closely with a team of experienced nurses to develop a solution that works for them and their patients. Patients receive an immediate response from D.ASSIST so they know they have been heard and help is on the way. Patients can also request other things such as playing music or listening to the news,” Deloitte Partner and product owner, Robert Spittle said.

Tobi Wilson – General Manager of the Prince of Wales Hospital says, “The hospital will continue to trial the technology and collect data over an extended period of time. The flexibility of the system was demonstrated when on one occasion a patient requested assistance from the bathroom. By asking D.ASSIST for the nurse, the patient’s needs were met even though they could not reach the call button.”

Major gifts making a difference

Thanks to the generous support of a major donor, a new Digital Subtraction Angiography unit (DSA) has been installed within the Medical Imaging Department of the Prince of Wales Hospital.

This new suite delivers high level interventional radiology services for our inpatients and outpatients.

"The minimally invasive procedures, mostly performed without general anaesthetic, are less intrusive and expensive, and have faster recovery times than their equivalent theatre operations."

These can include delivering chemotherapy directly to a tumour site via the arteries, the insertion of portacaths or lines to safely and comfortably deliver intravenous treatments or in the urgent treatment life threatening haemorrhages. The room also has general anaesthetic capability which is important for more complex procedures or for patients that require more intense medical support.

"The benefits to patients will be faster treatment and more state of the art minimally invasive treatment options. It is expected that hundreds of patients will be treated every year with this facility, and the number will only grow over the coming years," said Associate Professor Daniel Moses, Department Head of Medical Imaging.






